Nation's Report Card Shows a Decline in Math, Reading Scores (AP, April 2016)
The nation's high school seniors are slipping in math, and failing to make progress in reading, with just one-third of the 12th graders ready for the academic challenges of college. (read more)

Empathy In Math Class Can Improve Student Behavior (Science, April 2016)
School suspension rates have nearly tripled in the United states since the 1970's, rising from

just 3.7% of all students in 1974 to nearly 11% in 2011. That's a big deal because missed class means missed learning and suspensions can predict future unemployment and even incarceration. Now, a new study suggests that even a minor attitude adjustment among teachers can have a dramatic effect on those rates: Math teachers encouraged to be more empathetic saw student suspensions drop in half.
